The 2023 Solar Eclipse is an extraordinary and rare astronomical occurrence that represents a unique opportunity for Western Australia.

Tens of thousands of visitors are anticipated in the Gascoyne and Pilbara region to be a part of this once-in-alifetime event.

Exmouth is the most accessible land destination in the world to experience the phenomenon that will take place alongside the wonders of the UNESCO World-Heritage listed Ningaloo Marine Park.

Other communities in the region, including Carnarvon, Coral Bay and Onslow will experience a near Total Solar Eclipse with Perth experiencing a partial eclipse.

TOTALITY IN EXMOUTH

On April 20, the shadow of the moon will graze the tip of the state in a 40-kilometre-wide track, as it travels over one of the most beautiful parts of the world – the World Heritage-listed Ningaloo region near Exmouth.

Exmouth is the only town within the line of totality making it one of the only places on earth to experience a Total Solar Eclipse, one of nature's most phenomenal occurrences.

With WA hosting four of the next 13 Total Solar Eclipses it is the ultimate astrotourism destination for the next two decades.

AROUND WA

While Exmouth is in complete darkness for just over a minute, the rest of Western Australia will experience a partial solar eclipse, with some locations experiencing more 'darkness' than others.

The town of Onslow will experience a deep partial solar eclipse with over 99% of the sun being covered by the moon. Those south of Exmouth in Carnarvon will witness 95%, whilst in Perth will be approx. 70% coverage.

Solar Eclipse Eye Safety

The Department of Health does not recommend viewing an eclipse directly, including using eclipse glasses and equipment with specific solar filters. If you choose to use eclipse glasses understand the risks.

SOLAR ECLIPSE EYE SAFETY

It is never safe to look directly at the sun, and doing so may cause eye damage. The only way to guarantee that you do not get eye damage is by viewing the eclipse indirectly. Indirect methods include projecting an image of the sun onto a surface, such as using a pinhole viewer, or watching a live stream on the TV or online.

PARTIAL ECLIPSE

The Department of Health and the Australian Radiation Protection and Nuclear Safety Agency (ARPANSA) do not recommend direct viewing of the eclipse. Viewing a full or partial solar eclipse directly, including with the use of visual protection, can cause eve damage or permanent loss of vision.

IF YOU CHOOSE TO USE SOLAR ECLIPSE GLASSES, UNDERSTAND THE RISKS PLEASE REFER BELOW



Dark sunglasses, exposed xray film and welding shield will not provide suitable protection



Wearing solar eclipse glasses to look through a camera, binoculars or a telescope will not protect your eyes.



The Department of Health does not recommend viewing an eclipse directly, including using eclipse glasses and equipment with specific solar filters because:

- their quality cannot be guaranteed
- they may not block sufficient light
- they may have scratches, cracks or pin hole defects
- they frequently do not fit the face well and the gaps enable light to reach the eyes.

IF YOU CHOOSE TO USE SOLAR ECLIPSE GLASSES, UNDERSTAND THE RISKS

PARTIAL ECLIPSE

- Check that your glasses are marked with and meet ISO-12312-2020 certification
- Check your eclipse glasses for damage before use
- Place certified eclipse glasses on before looking at the eclipse and remove them ofter you have turned away from the eclipse. Do not remove your eclipse glasses while looking at the sun.



If using equipment only use specially designed filters for lenses.



Parents should supervise children during the eclipse to ensure they do not look directly at the sun, and if their children are using eclipse glasses, to ensure they fit the child's face properly and cover both eyes completely. If they don't, do not use them.



BE WATER WISE

Water has always been a precious resource in this part of the world and demand will be very high over the event period. We need to work together to save water. Here are some tips to be water wise.

PROTECT THE REGION

The natural marine and land environment throughout the region is exceptionally diverse, beautiful and precious. A range of measures are in place but we all have a duty to protect, care and conserve this pristine environment.

SOLAR ECLIPSE 20 April 2023



It's tropical cyclone and bushfire season in the north of our State.

To make sure you and your family stay safe during the 2023 Solar Eclipse, find out what you need to do to prepare.



Keep Fuel topped up – refuel at each town and keep extra fuel just in case



Have your own supply of food and water for emergencies – At least three litres of water per person to last at least 3 days.



Plans might change quickly during an emergency so be ready to act.



Know where to find emergency information.



Travel with an emergency kit. This should include:

- Portable, battery operated AM/FM radio
- First aid kit and manual
- List of emergency contact numbers
- Medications, prescriptions and toiletries
- Waterproof torch
- A portable battery charger for devices and spare batteries

EMERGENCY CONTACTS

There will be a number of events taking place across Exmouth, Carnarvon and Onslow and first aid stations staffed by trained first responders will be on hand.

If you find yourself in an emergency situation and are unable to attend a first aid station, call 000.

There is also two secondary emergency call service numbers, **112** and **106**.

112 is available from most mobile phones. 106 connects to the text-based relay service for people who have a hearing or speech impairment.

Telecommunications capacity has been increased to ensure a safe and enjoyable 2023 Solar Eclipse that the region, wider WA and the world can enjoy now and in the future.

Network connectivity differs across service providers in the regions. Visitors should check with their carriers.
